## Reflections on Our Journey: Time Always Wins

Events of the past two years have led me to think quite a lot about the concept of time. As I recall significant events, some seem far more distant than two years ago, and some feel as if they happened yesterday.

When I was growing up, one of my Dad’s favorite scriptures, which led to many “object lessons” for my siblings and me, came from the 3<sup>rd</sup> Chapter of Ecclesiastes. You probably know it well: “To everything, there is a season, a time for every purpose under heaven . . .”

I’ve been thinking about the many ways we casually refer to the ways we approach time: saving time, biding time, wasting time, spending time, finding time, making time . . .

Some of the words we pair with “time” imply that we have some sort of control over something that is actually quite inflexible. Have you ever experienced a day that varied from the standard 24-hour time frame? Of course not. Even when we experience Daylight Saving Time, we don’t actually “lose” or “gain” an hour; the concept of time is simply rearranged by human imagination.

After a long 2 years, the world had an opportunity to experience some fun a few weeks ago. Even for those who are not sports fans, this was an exciting event! With the clock running out . . . with 13 seconds, to be exact, the Kansas City Chiefs made a series of incredible plays and made a come-from-behind, last second play that won the playoff game! The highlight film was on the morning local and national news programs. The story provided us a light, fun, engaging spark after a long season of living through the many hardships of a pandemic. This story is one example of how we are coming out of this long season into the next. And it makes us wonder, what will be next?

We could say “only time will tell”. If time itself were a sporting event, time would “win” the day. It owns the day. It is the day. When the proverbial clock runs out, time is out. We can do our best to “save” it, “spend” it, “make” it, even conquer it in some way - - and it will continue as it always has and always will. We can choose how we describe it, if we cooperate with it or fight against it, and how we pour ourselves into it. But we can expect to have the allotted 24 hours per day, as long as we are in this world.

A commentary on Ecclesiastes describes this passage as “a glimmer of hope in seeing God as the master of time”. What an awesome, amazing relief! As I think about time, the reminder that God is the owner, creator, master, and giver of time and every other gift we have in our world - fills me with hope and awe. Whatever is truly “next” in this time and all the time to come, God is already there. Savor your time.

## Ramblings of the Associate Pastor

Several snowy days during February provided motivation to slow down and enjoy the sights of the season. As you may recall, we have been replacing windows in our house, so some of this work has improved our point of view. We built a new covered bridge bird feeder for our back yard, which added a second feeding zone for critters. Socks the cat keeps watch from his new windowsill which thus far has instilled sufficient warning to any potential invaders. He has grown into a mature cat now consisting of fifteen pounds of fur and purr, and about three ounces of teeth and claws. May God have mercy on any critter that provokes a meeting with those teeth and paws with claws. As for us, the couple blankets of snow have made a fresh view of the outside world. Our feeders have attracted swarms of reds cardinals which contrast against the white background creating a picturesque scene. There have been a few snow showers with giant clumpy flakes which ought to crash into the ground with drumming thumps but seem to silently drift past the window view without a care. Frequently the birds and squirrels perch on the magnolia limbs right outside windows waiting for their opportunity inside the feeding zone, which seems to taunt the cat into a chattering frenzy. All things considered, the view from the inside is relaxing and sometimes dreamy.

From the outside looking in, the perspective is different. Socks sneers at the yard guests with a look that threatens any onlookers and evokes ideas for a retreat to safety. He is primarily an indoor cat, but even during winter we let him outside periodically for an inspection of the perimeter. When he enters the yard, all visitors scatter, including any wandering cats from the neighboring farm. He usually doesn't stay outside in the yard for long before he returns to the door and howls for readmittance. During winter, I suppose he looks back at his inside perch from the yard and wonders why he wanted outside in the first place? We have continued limited project work inside our unheated garage during these cold winter evenings, but quickly return to the warmth of the house. Enjoying the outside scenery from inside the house is very different from experiencing the outside, isn't it?

When I was a child, my mom said to me, "you make a better door than a window". As I remember it, I must have been standing in her way obstructing her view of something? I am sure it was not my intention to be an obstruction, but somehow, I was in the wrong place at the wrong time. On the other hand, maybe she was teaching me something about opening a pathway? How can I be more inclusive and inviting? How can I be a door for others to pass through, instead of just a window? "*Behold, I stand at the door and knock. ... If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come inside to him and eat with him, and he with me.*" (Rev 3:20, ESV). Jesus seeks an entrance to our life. How can we be an entrance for those on the outside to meet Jesus within us and our church?

## Lenten Bible Study

Beginning on March 8<sup>th</sup> the Tuesday evening Bible Study Group will begin our Lenten Study. This year we will be following the Adam Hamilton video series "*Final Words: From the Cross.*"

From the publisher we read:

In life and in death, Jesus' words were powerful and meaningful. Despite the serious effort and increased pain required for Jesus to speak as he hung on the cross, Jesus spoke seven "final words" statements that have much to teach us about Jesus, his Father, and ourselves: "Father, Forgive Them." "Behold Your Son....Behold Your Mother." "My God, Why Have You Forsaken Me?" "Today You Will Be with Me in Paradise!" "Thirst." "It Is Finished." "Into Your Hands I Commit My Spirit."

In this inspiring series Pastor Adam Hamilton explores these final words as seen and heard through the eyes and ears of those who stood near the cross.

## **A Praying Place**

In the January 24th devotion from Walking in Grace (formerly Daily Guideposts), I read about a married couple who had made a fresh determination to pray together every evening. The writer (Stephanie Thompson) was amazed to discover the pressure that her husband was under at work, as they prayed. "I had expected my resolution to bring me closer to God," Stephanie writes. "Praying with Michael was bringing me a new understanding of my husband, too." Whether praying with a spouse or with our brothers and sisters in Christ, such times of sharing can definitely enhance our relationships and our love for one another.

Also in Walking in Grace (January 10<sup>th</sup>), Edward Grinnan describes New York City as "a praying place", with over 2,000 churches as well as many other opportunities to worship. The prophet Isaiah (Is. 56:7) and later our Lord Jesus (Matt. 21:13) declare that prayer should indeed be the central mission of the church. Isaiah foretells, "These I will bring to my holy mountain and give the joy in my house of prayer. Their burnt offerings and sacrifices will be accepted on my altar; for my house will be called a House of Prayer for all nations."

On March 10<sup>th</sup> we, the people of Memorial, will have an opportunity to strengthen our bonds and affirm our identity as a House of Prayer. We will meet in the Chapel at 10 AM for "A Time of Prayer and Reflection", sponsored by the UMW but open to men as well as women (including those praying spouses!). Besides praying for the pressing concerns of our world and our church, we will draw closer together through the sharing of our own requests. There will be a time of Communion, led by Pastor Tim, followed by fellowship and refreshments provided by the Margaret Circle. Please sign up in the Narthex if you are able to attend.

It is my heartfelt desire that events like the one to be held on March 10<sup>th</sup> will strengthen the culture of prayer at Memorial, so that we might become known in our community as "a praying place", a House of Prayer, where folks will feel free to come to find compassion, help, and answers for their most desperate needs. As we align ourselves more closely to the vision of Isaiah and of Jesus, I believe that the Lord will be released to pour out blessings upon our church and upon our people in amazing and wonderful ways!

## March Missions

March and April's 2<sup>nd</sup> mile giving is annual Lenten giving and is dedicated to IOP Illulu Orphan Project (IOP). This project was started by Berit Skaare In conjunction with the Mennonite church of Washington. It has grown to be much more than an orphanage for young girls. It is now a school of K through 12, a working farm and an orphanage for boys and girls. This project has been a part of Memorial for over 20 years and has included visits to IOP and college tuition sponsorships. There are a few examples of children needing sponsorships on the Missions bulletin board opposite the kitchen.

February's United Campus Ministries (UCM) speaker was Betsy Hine. UCM is no longer sponsored by the many churches it once was. Memorial's support for United Campus Ministries no longer comes from the church budget, but strictly from the 2<sup>nd</sup> mile giving, so please, if you haven't already, give generously.

The doors remain open for worship and masks are not required if you are fully immunized. Please follow all the commonsense rules and keep your distance. With a sanctuary that seats nearly 500 and an attendance in the second service of 35 to 40 there is plenty of space for social distancing. While online worship is a suitable alternative, there is no better place to worship than in God's House.

Missions meets on the second Tuesday of each month at 5:45PM **all are invited to join the conversation**. If anyone has a charity or mission that you feel we should act on, **please feel free to join us**. We can use the input of all to determine where best to place our missions. There is no budget item for Missions, so your 2<sup>nd</sup> time and talent is a major portion of the missions of Memorial.

You are invited to stop by the mission's bulletin board (across from the kitchen). While not aesthetically pleasing, it does contain several missional opportunities that could be filled on an individual basis. We are a missional church and we will continue to be such.

Please continue to bring in peanut butter for 14<sup>th</sup> and Chestnut. **We are the "Peanut Butter Church"**.

Remember there are always ways to donate without attending church. The first is to drop by the church office and drop off a second mile donation. The second is electronically. You can now give at GiveMemorial.org or open to the Church website (umcmemorial.com) and tap on the menu button in the upper right corner. Then select GIVING from the menu. If you have not donated this way before, create a profile. If you have, simply login. Then you can select where you want to give (2<sup>nd</sup> Mile Giving is the second selection) and the amount. After you complete the first page the second page allows you to enter all your donation information, including a NOTE to be more specific about this donation. (Note if you use VPN you must disable it before entering the giving site.) One final note, all Memorial services are available at MemorialSunday.org.
